



The Geographic Perspective

The Carnegie California Global Affairs Survey allows respondents to select their geographic residence. The full survey report includes findings on geographic gaps and divides across all four survey sections: California's Consistent Global Priorities; Global Challenges and Local Impact; California and Transpacific Affairs; and California and Global Engagement. For quick reference, we have listed a number of the notable findings related to the geographic perspective.

Similarities, even some surprising:
